Once you meet Marie and her baby, you feel the determination Marie has to not only love and take care of her baby, but also to keep up with her English language and life skills classes at Caroline House.

Marie emigrated from Haiti in 2016. She heard about Caroline House from her husband's friend and enrolled in classes last January. Marie had learned some English in Haiti, but once she moved to the U.S. - and especially when she found out she was going to be a mother - she was determined to learn more English. In fact, at home she now speaks only English with her husband, even though Haitian Creole is their first language. (Marie knows French and some Spanish, too!)

Marie says, "Before, when I went for my doctor visits, I needed an interpreter. Now, I don't need an interpreter. I call the hospital myself and make checkup appointments for my baby in English."

Marie is one of the many strong women who are building better lives for themselves and their families through **education and determination**.

The Elephant & Piggie books by Mo Willems have great examples of sharing, kindness and empathy.

This summer an attic storage area was renovated to create much-needed program space.


The room was transformed into a bright, open and welcoming space that is home to our new **Community Programs and** Outreach Office.
